RECEIVING OF THE LORD'S SUPPER AT ZION



- (b) who have been instructed in the truth of Holy Scripture as taught in the Lutheran Confessions, who have been confirmed in this Lutheran faith, and who now confess the same doctrines that are taught in this congregation, holding membership in a congregation of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod;
- (c) who believe that in this sacrament the real body and blood of Christ are truly distributed to them and orally received by them, bestowing on them the forgiveness of sins, life and salvation;
- (d) who **sincerely repent** of all their sins, and desire to receive God's forgiveness in this holy meal. Guests at our services, before receiving the sacrament, are requested to affirm these facts with one of our pastors. Thank you for honoring our practice. If you are looking for a church home, would like to be a member of Zion, or would like to learn more about the Christian Faith, please speak to one of our pastors about our membership classes.

The Old Testament Reading is Isaiah 5:1-7

Let me sing for my beloved my love song concerning his vineyard:

My beloved had a vineyard on a very fertile hill.

He dug it and cleared it of stones, and planted it with choice vines; he built a watchtower in the midst of it.

and hewed out a wine vat in it:

and he looked for it to yield grapes, but it yielded wild grapes.

And now, O inhabitants of Jerusalem and men of Judah, judge between me and my vineyard.

What more was there to do for my vineyard,

that I have not done in it?

When I looked for it to yield grapes, why did it yield wild grapes?

And now I will tell you what I will do to my vineyard.

I will remove its hedge, and it shall be devoured;

I will break down its wall, and it shall be trampled down.

I will make it a waste; it shall not be pruned or hoed,

and briers and thorns shall grow up;

I will also command the clouds that they rain no rain upon it.

For the vineyard of the LORD of hosts is the house of Israel, and the men of Judah are his pleasant planting;

and he looked for justice, but behold, bloodshed;

for righteousness, but behold, an outcry!

The Epistle is Philippians 3:4b-14

If anyone else thinks he has reason for confidence in the flesh, I have more: circumcised on the eighth day, of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness, under the law blameless. But whatever gain I had, I counted as loss for the sake of Christ. Indeed, I count everything as loss because of the surpassing worth of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things and count them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but that which comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God that depends on faith—that I may know him and the power of his resurrection, and may share his sufferings, becoming like him in his death, that by any means possible I may attain the resurrection from the dead.

Not that I have already obtained this or am already perfect, but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own. Brothers, I do not consider that I have made it my own. But one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus.

The Gospel is Matthew 21:33-46

[Jesus said,] "Hear another parable. There was a master of a house who planted a vineyard and put a fence around it and dug a winepress in it and built a tower and leased it to tenants, and went into another country. When the season for fruit drew near, he sent his servants to the tenants to get his fruit. And the tenants took his servants and beat one, killed another, and stoned another. Again he sent other servants, more than the first. And they did the same to them. Finally he sent his son to them, saying, 'They will respect my son.' But when the tenants saw the son, they said to themselves, 'This is the heir. Come, let us kill him and have his inheritance.' And they took him and threw him out of the vineyard and killed him. When therefore the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those tenants?" They said to him, "He will put those wretches to a miserable death and let out the vineyard to other tenants who will give him the fruits in their seasons."

Jesus said to them, "Have you never read in the Scriptures:

"The stone that the builders rejected has become the cornerstone; this was the Lord's doing, and it is marvelous in our eyes'?

Therefore I tell you, the kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people producing its fruits. And the one who falls on this stone will be broken to pieces; and when it falls on anyone, it will crush him "

When the chief priests and the Pharisees heard his parables, they perceived that he was speaking about them. And although they were seeking to arrest him, they feared the crowds, because they held him to be a prophet.

What Doctor Luther Says:

About Christ, a Stumbling Stone, Then and Now

When those people hear [about relying on Christ and His righteousness alone], they recoil, stumble, and are offended. They say: "What? Do you mean to say that chastity, celebrating Mass, and similar good works amount to nothing? The devil tells you to say this." They cannot adjust themselves to the thought that what they undertake to do is not good, but they think that it is pleasing to God. They even quote passages from Scripture and say: "God has commanded us to do good works." When one chooses to refute them, they begin to shout: "Heretic! Heretic! Fire! Fire!" Therefore they cannot endure the Stone and want to overturn It. Thus they collide with this Stone and cannot avoid being crushed by It, as Christ says in Matt. 21:42, 44: "Have you never read in the Scriptures: 'The very Stone which the builders rejected has become the Head of the corner?'... And he who falls on this Stone will be broken to pieces; but when It falls on anyone, It will crush him." Therefore do as you please, this Stone is no joke. It has been laid, and It will remain in position. He who wants to collide with It and scoff at It will have to cave in.

This is the stumbling and the offense about which Scripture says a great deal. ... this Stone will fall on all unbelievers and crush them. Therefore even though Christ is such a choice and precious Stone, yet through no fault of His He must also be called "a Stone that will make men stumble, a Rock that will make them fall." And just as the Jews have done, so we also always do today. For just as they boasted with God's name that they were God's people, so it happens today too. Christ is denied today under the name of Christ and the Christian Church, and the precious Stone is rejected. He comes because they should reject their works. But this they cannot endure, and they reject Him.


