
- (a) who have been **baptized** in the Name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit,

- (d) who sincerely repent of all their sins, and desire to receive God's forgiveness in this holy meal.

Guests at our services, before receiving the sacrament, are requested to affirm these facts with one of our pastors. Thank you for honoring our practice. Readings for the Sixth Sunday of Easter

The First Reading is Acts 16:9-15

A vision appeared to Paul in the night: a man of Macedonia was standing there, urging him and saying, "Come over to Macedonia and help us." And when Paul had seen the vision, immediately we sought to go on into Macedonia, concluding that God had called us to preach the gospel to them.

So, setting sail from Troas, we made a direct voyage to Samothrace, and the following day to Neapolis, and from there to Philippi, which is a leading city of the district of Macedonia and a Roman colony. We remained in this city some days. And on the Sabbath day we went outside the gate to the riverside, where we supposed there was a place of prayer, and we sat down and spoke to the women who had come together. One who heard us was a woman named Lydia, from the city of Thyatira, a seller of purple goods, who was a worshiper of God. The Lord opened her heart to pay attention to what was said by Paul. And after she was baptized, and her household as well, she urged us, saying, "If you have judged me to be faithful to the Lord, come to my house and stay." And she prevailed upon us.

The Epistle is Revelation 21:9-14, 21-27

Then came one of the seven angels who had the seven bowls full of the seven last plagues and spoke to me, saying, "Come, I will show you the Bride, the wife of the Lamb." And he carried me away in the Spirit to a great, high mountain, and showed me the holy city Jerusalem coming down out of heaven from God, having the glory of God, its radiance like a most rare jewel, like a jasper, clear as crystal. It had a great, high wall, with twelve gates, and at the gates twelve angels, and on the gates the names of the twelve tribes of the sons of Israel were inscribed— on the east three gates, on the north three gates, on the south three gates, and on the west three gates. And the wall of the city had twelve foundations, and on them were the twelve names of the twelve apostles of the Lamb. ...

And the twelve gates were twelve pearls, each of the gates made of a single pearl, and the street of the city was pure gold, transparent as glass.

And I saw no temple in the city, for its temple is the Lord God the Almighty and the Lamb. And the city has no need of sun or moon to shine on it, for the glory of God gives it light, and its lamp is the Lamb.

By its light will the nations walk, and the kings of the earth will bring their glory into it, and its gates will never be shut by day—and there will be no night there. They will bring into it the glory and the honor of the nations. But nothing unclean will ever enter it, nor anyone who does what is detestable or false, but only those who are written in the Lamb's book of life.

The Gospel is John 16:23-33

[Jesus said:] "In that day you will ask nothing of me. Truly, truly, I say to you, whatever you ask of the Father in my name, he will give it to you. Until now you have asked nothing in my name. Ask, and you will receive, that your joy may be full.

"I have said these things to you in figures of speech. The hour is coming when I will no longer speak to you in figures of speech but will tell you plainly about the Father. In that day you will ask in my name, and I do not say to you that I will ask the Father on your behalf; for the Father himself loves you, because you have loved me and have believed that I came from God. I came from the Father and have come into the world, and now I am leaving the world and going to the Father." His disciples said, "Ah, now you are speaking plainly and not using figurative speech! Now we know that you know all things and do not need anyone to question you; this is why we believe that you came from God." Jesus answered them, "Do you now believe? Behold, the hour is coming, indeed it has come, when you will be scattered, each to his own home, and will leave me alone. Yet I am not alone, for the Father is with me. I have said these things to you, that in me you may have peace. In the world you will have tribulation. But take heart; I have overcome the world."

What Doctor Luther Says:

About Baptizing Children (Even Entire Households)

[On the quarrelsome, obstinate rebellious spirits'] side they can produce no statement which says, "You are to baptize adults but no children." We are however persuaded by many good reasons to hold that child baptism is right and that children do believe.

First, because child baptism derives from the apostles and has been practiced since the days of the apostles. We cannot oppose it, but must let it continue, since no one has yet been able to prove that in baptism children do not believe or that such baptism is wrong. ...

In the fifth place, ... [if the church] is the temple of God it is not a haunt of heretics, but true Christendom, which must truly have a baptism which is right beyond any doubt. We see and hear of no other than child baptism, whether under the pope, among the Turks, or in all the world. Christ commands the children to come and to be brought to him, and, in Matt. 19 (:14) says that theirs is the kingdom of God. The apostles baptized entire households [Acts 16:15]. ...

In the sixth place, since God has made a covenant with all heathen through the gospel and ordained baptism as a sign thereof, who can exclude the children? ... [H]e commands that all the world shall receive it. On the strength of that command (since none is excluded) we confidently and freely baptize everyone, excluding no one except those who oppose it and refuse to receive this covenant. If we follow his command and baptize everyone, we leave it to him to be concerned about the faith of those baptized.

Summary of meeting of the Council of Elders, May 1, 2025 (The following summary is being provided in accordance with the congregation's bylaws, §VIII)

Attendance:

Elders present: R. Lammert (chairman), A. Litke (secretary),

F. Jackson, J. Teasdale, K. Vlot.

Elders absent: W. Krause, T. Muehl.

Pastor present: Pr. Punke.

Pastor Punke led the elders in a devotion by continuing the reading of Article V of the Apology of the Augsburg Confession.

In his pastor's report, Pastor Punke reported on recent deaths and upcoming funerals among members, former members, and friends of Zion, on health and other pastoral care matters, and on adult catechesis. Pastor Punke updated the elders on calls he has made to inactive members, on plans for time away this summer, on the worship returning to the sanctuary, on issues related to the April 9 lightning strike, on the CADDS survey, on LSUS, and on CLHS.

The elders reviewed Pillar 1, Goal #1: "Starting April 1, 2025, Zion will experience a 10% increase in average worship attendance by June 30, 2025." Pastor Punke included information on calls he had made on inactive members in his pastor's report. Pastor Punke and Melvia will work on developing a list of the longer-term inactive members (those with an absence longer than four Sundays). The elders will review the list with Pastor Punke at the June meeting, and begin determining the best way of contacting these members with the goal of involving them again in the Word and Sacrament ministry of the congregation.

The elders reviewed Pillar 2, Goal #1: "In January of 2025, Zion will commence an annual opportunity for providing resources and training for members to gain confidence in inviting neighbors to Zion." This goal is currently on hold; the elders will schedule another *Every One His Witness* workshop for the fall.

The elders reviewed Pillar 2, Goal #4: "The Council of Elders will conduct the CADDS survey before Easter 2025." The survey will close on May 4. About two weeks after this date, the synod will send a summary of the results to Zion. The elders approved the establishment of an ad hoc committee to review the survey

results and begin to make recommendations based on them, with the committee consisting of two elders, two members of the Administrative Council, and one member of the Education Council. Frank Jackson and Kurt Vlot are the elders appointed to the committee.

Art Litke, chairman of the Pastoral Support and Assistance Committee, reported that the committee had met on April 24 to make recommendations to the Administrative Council for the salaries for the pastor, the director of music, and the office manager.

The elders completed the review of the Council of Elders' document on Communion Procedure. The document was approved by the council. The document will now be available from the secretary of the congregational assembly (David Laisure) to any member of the congregation, as per Zion By-law XIV.C.

The meeting was closed by praying the Lord's Prayer.
